

### Numeracy

There is real interest within the ministry and the Math PSA in revising and refining the numeracy performance standards. Your support in examining the new standards, in exploring tasks, and in providing feedback to the educators working to make them of the highest quality would be most appreciated. Requests will be coming out in the New Year. In addition. UBC is holding а symposium on Aboriginal Math in January. We'll let you know all details as soon as they are confirmed.



### Science

We hope that some of you have taken advantage of the draft science performance standards, as they are exceptionally useful. Advanced Education has declared that this is the year of science – so this is a great opportunity to profile an area that has INQUIRY at the heart of the discipline. #### Health

We know that many of you have read John Ratey's book Spark – and are using it as a motivation to START every day with a walk or a run. . We have found his arguments very convincing and network schools in in the Yukon BC and have demonstrated the benefits from physical activity early in the day.

### Aboriginal Understandings: AESN

We are very impressed by the spirit of the work and the caliber of the thinking done by the educators in the AESN network. The Federal Deputy Minister of INAC (Indian and Northern Affairs Canada) believes that this work is an exemplary national initiative. A big thank you to those of you who have "stepped up" with approaches that are creating a more civil Canadian society and greater learning progress for all learners.

As BC residents we work in indigenous cultures of incredible depth and richness – and now through your work, many more young people are becoming aware of our history and of the strengths of Aboriginal people in a wide range of fields.

### Secondary Assessment

Lorna Earl is in the process of completing a major research study of secondary formative assessment practices in Ontario. As soon as her report is available we'll let you know. We expect to hear highlights and some of her recommendations at the spring seminar. We believe that some of the smartest secondary work in the world is taking place in BC. Network schools and Network teachers and leaders are sorting out the issues around coaching for learning and 'grading practices' in thoughtful ways - with their students as co-investigators and planners.

### **International Connections**

We have hosted many study tours over the last few years as a result of growing international awareness of the BC Network of Performance Based Schools as a sustained initiative with a clear focus on improving literacy, numeracy, social responsibility, health, science and Aboriginal understanding.

A team of educators from Wales attended ICSEI 2009 in Vancouver. Since then, Alma Harris, a lead researcher on leader development and improving schools in challenging circumstances, and Michelle Jones, a highly successful elementary principal have been seconded to the Welsh Assembly Government to lead their educational change strategy.

The connections between Wales and BC have continued to grow with a team from Wales attending the Network seminar last May. Network leaders were invited to Wales in July to work with principals and district leaders in the development of their inquiry communities and continue to serve as part of an international reference committee. An important step for the Welsh educators is to see the work firsthand. To this end, the British Council is funding several principal-teacher teams to spend February 12-18 in BC schools. The focus of this study tour is:

1. To understand how teachers are using the BC performance standards to strengthen student ownership and confidence in writing and reading; 2. To learn how Network schools are collaborating with and learning from each other.

Lynne Tomlinson and Sandi Stacey, regional Network leaders, are helping to coordinate this visit. We really appreciate the willingness of Network schools in the lower mainland to share their practice with these international visitors.

### **Congratulations - Alison Sidow.**

Alison's work in the Bulkley Valley and then as superintendent and Network leader in Gold Trail has made a big difference in the learning lives of young people and educators. Alison has accepted an appointment as Superintendent of Achievement starting January 2011. We are pleased that Alison will bring her inquiring mind to her role in leading the province towards greater responsiveness and equity.

In 2011 we are going to make a start by exploring the of draft development music performance standards at the elementary level. We are hoping to the Vancouver interest Opera Association, in conjunction with their involvement in youth programs, with this initiative. They are leading sessions on campus and are opening up their classrooms as learning labs for teacher candidates. Imagine being able to see state of the art assessment and inquiry practices at the very start of your career.

Network leaders in Prince George, Debbie Koehn, Frances Roch, Denise Wilson and Colleen Gurney are developing a coaching model with teacher candidates in which new teachers get n experienced network teacher as a 'coach.'
